### **Free Smoke Detectors and Night Lights for Seniors, Disabled and Homebound**

The Lisle-Woodridge Fire Protection District has a grant that provides free smoke detectors and night lights to seniors age 65 and older, the disabled, and homebound individuals. The fire department will provide and install the detectors and do a safety inspection of the home. While the grant does not provide for free carbon monoxide detectors, the fire department will install them while they are at the home if the owner has already purchased them. - The Resource Center offers many programs for our community members. September 24<sup>th</sup> was the first day for the After School Program. They have a total of 84 students enrolled from K through 6<sup>th</sup> grade. Homework hour is from 3:00 - 4:00 with enrichment programs in art, dance, crochet, and kids yoga following from 4:00 - 5:00.
- On October 18 at about 4:00 p.m. there will be a balloon release showing their support for Lights on After School. The balloons are tagged with identifying information so that people who find them and can return the tags and let the children know how far the balloons traveled. In past years some have gone as far as Indiana and Schaumburg.
- On October 25 the CRC will host a Latino Outreach Program meeting from 6-9 p.m.
- October 27 is Make a Difference Day. Teenage volunteers will assist senior residents in winterizing their yards and LWFD will check smoke and carbon monoxide detectors to ensure they are operational.
- The Resource Center had a very successful "Dancing with the CRC Kids" evening last June. Attendees had the opportunity to dance with Village Administrators as well as others. There were 200 attendees.
- The CRC will also continue hosting the College of DuPage and the Sisters of St. Joseph School on Wheels English as a Second Language classes and a computer class by Peoples Resource. It will be adding a computer class taught in Spanish.

**Parents as Teachers (PAT)** is a parent education and family support program serving families in Woodridge School District 68 throughout pregnancy until age 5. The program is offered in English and Spanish. Parents are supported by PAT-certified parent educators. By understanding what to expect during each stage of development, parents can easily capture the teachable moments in everyday life to enhance their child's language development, intellectual growth, social development and motor skills. A PAT family:

- Receives personal visits during which the parent educator shares age-appropriate child development and parenting information, helps the parents learn to observe their child, and addresses parenting concerns.
- Attends parent group meetings in which there are opportunities to share information about parenting issues and child development. Parents learn and support each other, observe their children with other children and practice parenting skills.
- Has their child participate in developmental playgroups.
- Screenings to assess the child's overall development as well as health, hearing and vision.
- Has access to a resource network that links their family to other community services.

**Woodridge School District 68** - Becky Surber, Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum

- The school district is the recipient of a PEP grant for Physical Education. The district will receive \$100,000 each year for 3 years to be used on fitness equipment for student use and nutrition information.
- The district also received a grant to train staff in Social/Emotional Learning Standards. Three teams of teachers were sent for training.
- Woodridge School District 68 and Midwestern University are currently in their third year of a campus-community partnership. This partnership, which is supported through a grant received by the university, was designed to help develop and implement new innovative programs and activities for children and families in the Goodrich and Jefferson Schools that will improve health literacy and preventative behaviors.
- Teachers are preparing for Red Ribbon Week and have met to coordinate efforts.
- Navigating the System training for bilingual parents will go statewide.

**Lisle Character Counts Alliance (LCCA) Presentation** - Pat DeAngelo, Debbie Pallardy and Barbara Reh.

The Lisle Character Counts Coalition originated in 2002 when a group of citizens came together to find a way to integrate the CHARACTER COUNTS! program into the Lisle community as a whole. It is a partnership between community members, schools, businesses, government and local service organizations to promote the six pillars of CHARACTER COUNTS!: trustworthiness, respect, fairness, responsibility, caring and citizenship.

Within the LCCA is a teen led group called **Lisle Teens with Character**. It began three years ago as a grass-roots effort by teens after founding the Flag Rally and volunteering their time in various areas of community service. The membership has grown to 85 members, who have contributed over 4,000 hours of service to the Lisle community since the inception of the group. The teens decide on service projects, maintain the website, run meetings, and follow up on service projects. Some of the many skills teens learn are: the running an organization, conflict resolution, social skills, and community leadership skills. The vast majority of funds raised during service projects are donated to charity.

**WCWC Website Discussion**

The group discussed ways to improve the WCWC website that is currently maintained by the Lisle Woodridge Fire Protection District. One suggestion was to add descriptions of programs serving Woodridge youth and families to the site so that the WCWC minutes would be clearer to a visitor to the site. Julie Rhodes suggested adding links to the programs within the minutes. Greg O'Donnell recommended buying the WCWC name so that individuals looking for the site could find it more easily.

**Past and Future Direction of Council**

Julie Burke explained that she had been told that the WCWC began as a consortium to oversee a drug or violence prevention grant, or both. Those grants were time limited and in time the Council directed its attention to the CHARACTER COUNTS! programs in the schools. It has been comprised of the schools, the community pantry, the park district, police and fire departments, the clergy, village staff, the village's youth service director, the library, the county health department, the Girl Scouts, Metropolitan Family Services, Breaking Free and the Lisle Township Youth and

Family Advisory Board. Many partnerships result from information shared in the meetings. The Council is about to connect community needs with available services. Chamber of Commerce website listing of community businesses is a very helpful resource. The chair asked if anyone could suggest a member of the faith community to be a member of the council. Pastor Dave Buerstetta of Woodridge United Methodist Church used to attend meetings but did not respond to a phone call and e-mail about this meeting.

**Selection of Vice-Chair**

The opportunity was offered for a WCWC member to become Vice-Chair of the council. Since no one came forward, members were asked to consider taking the position. The topic will be reconsidered at the next meeting.
